1. An open and honest dialogue

What do you like most about the internet and why?

The internet offers brilliant opportunities for making connections with others.


Who do you like to keep in touch with online and what apps/services do you use?

2. A balanced approach

As parents it's natural to feel worried about the risks posed by your child being online, but for young people the online world is exciting and fun, as it brings so many opportunities for them.



What are your favourite things to do online?



What risks might you come across on-line?

Do you know where to go for help, where to find safety advice and how to use safety tools on your favourite apps and games?

How do you stay safe online? What tips do you have and where did you learn them?

Talking about safety

Help me! Can your child show you how to do something better/safer online?

What is okay/not okay to share online? Why?
What could you do if you saw a friend online needed some help or support?

3. Using the tools available to help you

There are lots of tools to help you manage the devices used by your family.

Knowing how to activate and use parental controls can help protect your child from seeing inappropriate content online.
