Enfield in Bloom



Complaints Procedure

We do our very best to get everything right for your children and all our stakeholders. However, despite our best efforts we may sometimes fall short of your expectations.

There are different ways of bringing this to our attention. Firstly, make an appointment with the class teacher. Most issues can be resolved this way. If you remain dissatisfied and there is no change to the situation, make an arrangement with the year group Achievement Leader: Mrs Davis – Nursery and Reception; Mrs Redmore – Years 1 and 2; Miss Clarke – Years 3 and 4; Mrs Vourloumis – Year 5; Mr Taylor – Year 6. Please allow them to work with you to find a solution, they are very knowledgeable, empathetic and approachable. On the rare occasion that this doesn't lead to a satisfactory conclusion, get in touch with Mr Bless via the school office or find him in the playground at the start or end of the day.

Remember of course that at all times good and appropriate communication between us is expected and that having the right facts helps in getting to the correct solution quickly.

Like all schools, we have a complaints policy and procedure that can be found on our website.

Please don't let frustrations build up and talk to us before an issue escalates. Other ways of getting help can be through Miss Paddon – Inclusion Lead, Mrs Rees – Parent Support Advisor or Mr Campbell – Lead learning Mentor. Alternatively, come to the Parent Forum to seek clarification on any school policy or to suggests ways to improve the school – the next meeting is on 31st January at 9:00am and 6:00pm.

SCHOOL UNIFORM

Following consultation with parents it was agreed that all children are expected to wear the school uniform as this helps them to develop a sense of belonging and to help minimize cost.

Our school uniform is **green** and grey. A school sweatshirt, fleece, reading folder and cap, white polo shirt and sensible black shoes should be worn.

Year 6 pupils earn a black jumper at the start of the year in recognition of being good role models and adhering to our school behaviour policy. Black jumpers are only worn by year 6 pupils.

We are now able to offer a green sweatshirt style cardigan with the school logo; a sample may be viewed please enquire at the office.

The school dress policy takes account of the religious and cultural needs of all children.

P.E. KIT

In the interest of health and hygiene, all children should bring a complete change of clothes for P.E. This should include:

- a pair of plimsolls for indoor PE and trainers for outdoor PE
- a T-shirt
- a pair of shorts
- a bag in which to keep P.E. kit
- a band to tie up long hair

P.E. kit should be brought into school on a Monday and kept in school all week, taken home on Friday to wash P.E. shorts, T-shirts and a P.E. bag with a pair of plimsolls for indoor PE and trainers for outdoor PE
