# **Contact details**

We cannot stress enough the importance of keeping the school up to date with any changes in your address, telephone number and email. If we cannot get hold of you in an emergency, we have no choice other than to contact Social Services.

#### Do you ever wonder when it is the right time to leave your child at home alone?

The National Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children (NSPCC) have produced guidance for parents and carers. The NSPCC say:

The law doesn't actually say what age you can leave a child on their own. But it's against the law to leave a child alone if it puts them at risk.

All children are different, but follow this advice to keep your child safe.

- Never leave a baby or young child home alone, not even for a few minutes whether they're sleeping or awake. Most accidents happen at home, and children under the age of five are most at risk of getting hurt.
- Even if your child is approaching 12 they may not be mature enough to cope with an emergency. If you do need to leave them, make sure it's only for a short time.
- If leaving an older child alone, make sure they're happy about the arrangement and know when and how to contact you and the emergency services.
- If your child is under 16 they shouldn't be left alone overnight.
- Teach your child what to do if there's ever a problem. Keep your mobile phone with you **and make sure your child** knows your number. Also leave a list of people you trust for them to go to or call, such as a neighbour or relative.

#### What is neglect?

Parents can be prosecuted for neglect if they leave a child on their own "in a manner likely to cause unnecessary suffering or damage to health".

If you don't meet your child's basic needs, like food and warm clothing, fail to respond to their emotional needs, or constantly leave your child alone this is known as neglect.

Neglect is as serious as other forms of abuse because the effects can be damaging and long-lasting.
