


Walton on the Naze

Parents said it was a lovely start to their morning and a great end to the school year.




















Dear Parent/Carer

RE: CHANGES TO THE SCHOOL DAY FROM TUESDAY 4[™] SEPTEMBER 2018

By now all parents should be aware of the changes to the school day as well as our reasons for initiating this. You should also have completed the survey to indicate whether your child stays at 2:30pm for an enrichment activity or goes home.

As a school we are very excited at the many opportunities for our pupils, staff and parents and we look forward to starting the changes in September.

Please read the following information carefully:

New school day and hours

All learning starts 5 minutes after doors have opened; a prompt arrival is essential so that no learning time is missed. The school gates will open earlier at 8:15am and will close by 8:50am. In the afternoon they will open for the first collection at 2:20pm and close at 2:40pm; for the second collection, gates open at 3:20pm and close at 3:40pm.

All pupils from Years 1 to Years 6 will have a daily morning playtime.

Breakfast Club will continue to open at 7:30am and Grass Roots will be available from 3:30pm and finish at 6pm.

You will be hard pressed to find another school that offers this amount of flexibility to working or studying parents as you can choose from a 7:30am or 8:30am start and collections at 2:30pm, 3:30pm or 6:00pm.

Late collection

Children must be collected on time at either 2:30pm or 3:30pm, depending on the choices made on the survey. We will follow the current late collection policy. We will accept an earlier collection at 2:30pm but not an unscheduled late collection at 3:30pm. A parent must offer proof of new working or college arrangements before we change a mid-term change of 2:30pm to a 3:30pm pick up.

Enrichment

We are the only school that offers close to 30 different and exciting activities every day for Years 1&2, Years 3&4 and Years 5&6. Most are free and we are able to do this thanks to our wonderful support staff. Pupils have typically been allocated their first or second choice for most days. There will be limited flexibility to move pupils to a different activity as clubs will be fully subscribed. It is essential that parents encourage their children to give the activity a decent chance and that they support good behaviour at all times.

Some children may have been allocated the same activity more than once. This is due to a first choice being full and another choice offered. If vacancies in other clubs occur, we can start looking for changes.

We assume that pupils whose parents have not signed up will be going home at 2:30pm.

If this is not the case, then please see us promptly on Monday 3rd September between 8 and 9am or 2.30 and 3.30pm in the Community Room to sign up for the few remaining activities and spaces.

Cooking, Gospel Choir and gymnastics are some of the few paid-for clubs. Parents will be charged for these via Parent Pay. Please pay this promptly, otherwise your child is at risk of losing out.

If a member of staff is absent, your child will stay at school and may attend a different activity on that occasion.

Pick up from the activities will be roughly from the same areas that are currently used for each year group. We will communicate more exact locations. One teacher from each year group will also be available if you have any questions

The activities will change every term.

Resources

To ensure we can offer an exciting and free range of activities and opportunities we will from time to time be asking for donations of certain resources. At the moment we would welcome any LEGO, board games for all ages and puzzles of varying difficulty. Puzzles also include Rubik's cubes and other 3D puzzles. Donated items should be complete and clean.

Why are we doing this again?

Key to everything we do is your child's learning. From 2:30pm, teachers will be doing their planning, preparation and attend meetings or undertake professional development training. That means they will be with their class every school day, allowing for greater consistency and continuity. That should impact on pupils' progress and behaviour. More children will also have access to a greater range of informal learning opportunities and this will contribute to different relationships with the school. Parents of course can drop off and collect at a greater number of times.

I would like to thank our school community (staff, pupils, parents and governors) for their feedback, trust and patience to allow this initiative the best possible start.

Child safety on Fortnite: parent factsheet

Fortnite is an online video game where players compete to be the last person standing in a post-apocalyptic world. The most popular version is Fortnite: Battle Royale, which sees up to 100 players pitted against each other to stay alive on an island. Players can build and demolish structures, and collect weapons, supplies and armour to help them along the way.

Players shoot each other using a range of lethal weapons, but the brightly-coloured, cartoon-style graphics and lack of bloodshed mean it doesn't feel too gory or graphic.

To play, the age recommendation is **12 and above** due to 'mild violence', although you don't have to provide your age when creating an account, so younger children can still log on easily.

Fortnite: Battle Royale **is free to download** on PC/Mac, Xbox, Playstation, Nintendo Switch and iOS devices (Apple phones and tablets). It's coming to Android soon.

It has about 45 million monthly users worldwide including the England football team, who reportedly played it in their World Cup downtime.

What are the concerns?

You may have seen news reports or heard concerns raised about the:

- Communication between players: a chat function allows players to talk to each other either over a headset and microphone, or using messaging. Children could use it to speak to strangers, or it could put them at risk of cyberbullying
- **In-app purchases:** players can build up large bills on their parents' accounts by buying cosmetic items like outfits for your character and better-looking weapons (otherwise known as 'skins')
- Addictive nature of the game: anecdotal stories tell of children staying up all night to play, or falling asleep in lessons after playing for too long. Some commentators attribute this to the communal feel of the game – you can play with your friends – and the game is different every time you play, keeping it fresh

What safety options are available to parents?

Use the parental controls on the gaming device

Most devices allow you to set time limits on game play, set age limits for content, and restrict in-app purchases.

Visit the website 'ask about games' for links to detailed instructions on the device your child uses – the site covers Playstation 3, Playstation 4, Xbox 360, Xbox One, Apple and Android phones, and Nintendo Switch.

The battles in Fortnite last around 20 minutes. When trying to limit your child's screen time, make the most of this natural stopping point. Set a limit in terms of matches rather than hours and minutes, or set time limits in 20 minute increments.

Turn off the voice chat feature

Speak to your child to make sure they know this feature exists, and encourage them to use the options below if they encounter someone who is offensive or inappropriate.

You can disable the voice chat function in the game if you:

- Open the settings menu (the 3 lines on the right-hand-side of the screen), then choose the 'cog' icon
- Select the 'audio' tab

You can disable the voice chat function in the game if you:

- Open the settings menu (the 3 lines on the right-hand-side of the screen), then choose the 'cog' icon
- Select the 'audio' tab
- You should be able to turn off 'voice chat' by tapping the arrows next to it

You can also 'mute' individual players in the game by:

- Pausing the game
- Hovering over the player you wish to mute
- Selecting the mute button (a loudspeaker icon)

Make sure your child knows how to report inappropriate behaviour

You or your child can report players who make them uncomfortable using the in-game feedback tool (located in the main menu).

You can also use the 'support' section of the Epic Games site (the makers of Fortnite). You're asked to select the platform you play the game on, the game mode you're playing, and then you can select 'report player'. You can provide more detail such as the player's name, and attach a screenshot.

- Talk to your child about what they're doing online, and make sure they know they can talk to you about anything that has
 upset them
- Check your bank statements and gaming system account balance regularly to look for in-app purchases you're not happy with, and to make sure your child isn't getting around any passwords you've set up
