Last week, Year 3 had visitors from Lee Valley who brought our pupils all the way back to the Stone Age through some hands-on experiences.



Last week, Year 3 had visitors from Lee Valley Education Centre to teach us about the Stone Age. Each class had a whole day of fun activities that helped them to discover how Stone Age people lived and what their experiences may have been like.

The classes learnt about chronology and human evolution as well as discovering what edible plants and berries we had in our school that Stone Age people might have used.

After lunch, our Lee Valley visitors showed us how to make fire and how difficult it was for Stone Age people to do this. We all practised making a fire by the square hall. Don't worry, it was all very safe.

Finally, we got a chance to look at fossils and examine them in detail. In groups we had to decide which fossils belonged to which animals.

Overall, the day was really interesting and helped us to really understand what we had already been taught in our History lessons this half-term.




School Lunch Arrears

School meals debts on ParentPay – when an account falls below £12.50 credit a reminder is sent to parents to top up their account. Any child whose parents' accounts have gone into arrears will not be given a school meal.

Parents will be contacted on a daily basis by phone to ask them to bring a packed lunch in for their child or to take them home for lunch.

In circumstances where the parent cannot be contacted then the child will be given a snack and we will continue to endeavour to contact their parents. No further meals will be given until the debt has been recovered.
