Home learning

Home learning is now set on a Friday for all pupils via TEAMs with a deadline for the following Thursday. Please let your class teacher know if you have any issues accessing this.

Reading is always a priority for our school and more so now that so much learning has been missed. Do ensure that your child reads every day and take time to discuss the text together as well as tricky vocabulary. That is one of our key targets this year.

Please help your children to learn the key mathematics facts from the previous years. Years 5 and 6 should, for example, already know all their times tables facts.

Mentors for Times Tables

In Year 6 the focus for our tables is speed. We are practising the speed of our tables every day with a mixed selection of questions. If we get 20 out of 20 three times in a row we are awarded a Mentor badge. This means we can help others in our year group to increase their speed of recall so answering tables becomes automatic. We need our tables so we can do our arithmetic and reasoning questions quickly and accurately. Hopefully, later in the year the mentors will be able to support children in other year groups.




Year 1 identified the difference between old and new items.









Year 5 continued to look at the Viking settlers this week.








Year I have been working hard on their topic Body and Senses'. We spent time labelling the body and using our sense of smell this week. The children have been learning with their teacher and

Archaeological Dig









Archaeological Dig in Albany Park

A large trench in Albany Park is now being dug and already items from the past are unearthed. Our pupils will be given the opportunity to help with sorting and classifying some of these, using gloves and tools to protect their hands.

An archaeological dig as large as this doesn't come along often and as a school we are therefore grateful that our pupils can become real life History Detectives and have their learning enhanced in many different ways. We will of course keep you updated on this exiting project and hope to inform you of some amazing finds!

What is a History Detective?

 A History Detective is somebody who looks at evidence from the past.

 History Detectives want to learn about the past from the clues other people leave behind.





Besides History, the finds from an archaeological dig link to all other subjects we teach at school. Discuss with your child how a pottery sherd a metal object or sea shell could link with geography, science, art, DT etc.

Can you spell? archaeology

From the archaeologist:

Archaeology is always unpredictable, and Albany is no exception. I had hoped for lots of prehistoric material, encouraged by what was found at Moxey's Nursery Imammoth tooth], now the site of your school. From a finds point of view, that has been a bit disappointing. We have a few flint tools but no animal remains. It is mostly huge expanses of gravel and clay laid down at the end of the last ice age and beginning of the modern period. From an academic viewpoint this has interest, but not very exciting for children except to show how archaeology works by reading the layers (stratigraphy).

unexpectedly though, near the surface we found large amounts of Victorian and Edwardian pottery sherds, glass, clay tobacco pipes, together with some metal work, animal bone and shells. This material seems to belong to the closing days of College Farm, from about 1850 to when the Council bought the first parcel of land to form the park, and represents manuring to try to improve the quality of the soil. Some also belonged to areas which were allotments, not included in the park until 1920.

<u>Vocabulary</u>: Sherd or shard? In the letter above, the word 'sherd' is used. When do we use *sherd* and when is it *shard*?
