Dear Parents/Carers, Governors and Friends,

This time last year I wrote in my newsletter: "We are already excited about the next term." Having completed a very busy Autumn Term 2019, we were already looking forward to our programme for the Spring and Summer terms of 2020.

However, it didn't take long for learning at our school (and life in general) to become very different than anticipated.

Whilst our teachers continued to carefully craft lessons, they now also had had to consider *if*, *how* and especially *where* their pupils would be accessing that learning.

When children returned to school, much had changed. It was dominated by hand washing and staying in bubbles. Friends and adults were in one day and not the next, absent for weeks at a time and perhaps teaching from a distance. We still continue with different start and finish times, one way areas, eating lunch in the classroom and restricted use of the playground.

Teachers were alarmed that previous learning was quickly forgotten and that too many in their classes had not been able to join in remote lessons, leading to lost learning.

Thankfully, something did not change – our pupils! On their return to school they were the same 'ready to learn', friendly, smiley selves. They put their trust in the adults teaching and helping them.

What also remained the same was our ambition for their learning, our passion to teach and help, to plan engaging lessons and experiences. To be creative in finding solutions and be forward thinking. To do what is right.

So, what does 2020 teach us about forward planning? Should we be less excited about 2021? Should we not make plans for the future? Should we put life on hold until everyone has received the vaccine and the virus is largely beaten?

In the Nativity story, Mary didn't plan on having a baby. She and Joseph were told quite unexpectedly to travel a long distance. They hoped to find a comfortable place to stay but were given a stable. And, imagine the difficult of giving birth without a nurse at hand. Then suddenly they had to manage all these visitors as if it was normal to have angels, shepherds and wise men arriving unannounced to worship your first born child. Finally, they were told not to return to their home but to flee the country as the King wanted their baby killed.

What we can learn from 2000 years ago, this year and any in between is that we have to be prepared to be flexible, that plans may change, to not be surprised when the unexpected happens. What matters however is how we manage change or any set-back. To not to take adversity personally, to be patient and behave responsibly. To learn from and move on. Not to blame but to take positive action. To think of solutions and be ready to adjust our plans. Not to be beaten by it no matter how long or how hard it seems to get. To know that we are not alone and to talk to others and work out a solution together. And also remember, there are always people who have it even harder than us and yet they manage with a smile and with dignity. They show true resilience.

I for one am again looking forward to a lot of things in the new year. My diary is full of planned activities and events for 2021. Not least the pantomime on 21st January. But first, I cannot wait to spend quality time with my family and then for your return on Tuesday 5th January.

In the meantime: be safe, be kind.



POW's Got Talent!




As with so much this year, our annual Talent Show looks very different but has still been a fun celebration of the children's talents.

Design and Technology in Year 3




We practised a range of stitching techniques, such as the running stitch and the back stitch.


One final thing, if you can, buy or borrow a chessboard because in the new year I'll be teaching you how to play chess online.


Year 4 - Torches

If you think you child or any member of your family household has, or think they have symptoms of Coronavirus, please do not attend this appointment. Symptoms include fatigue, fever, persistent cough, sore throat, shortness of breath, diarrhea, chills and skin rashes.

On the Day:

- Please be on time so we can manage the session safely for the benefit of all. Please note that latecomers may not been seen
- The young person can be accompanied by 1 adult only
- Depending on the venue the adult may be asked to wait outside the building whilst the young person is being immunised
- Facemasks will be provided to every young person if required
- Standard Covid-19 screening questions will be asked prior to the young person being admitted to the building


