Dear Parents/Carers, Governors and Friends,

App and Internet Safety

It can be difficult to monitor what your child is viewing online. Sometimes your child may stumble upon unsuitable sites by accident, through apps they've downloaded to their mobile device or through links they've been sent by friends, chatting to others online, or even through inter-device communication systems such as Bluetooth or Apple's AirDrop.

Find out about the type of inappropriate content that your child may see across the platforms and apps they use and what the challenges are to keeping them safe. You can research games and apps that children use/play here: Net Aware: Your guide to social networks, apps and games (net-aware.org.uk). See also our website Online Safety | PoW and also the poster on page 5.

Although there are a number of tools you can use to closely <u>monitor what they are doing on their device</u> and block access to certain content through <u>filters</u>, preparing your child for what they might see is vital to make sure they know how to deal with it if they see something they shouldn't.

Parents/carers should use parent locks on the internet at home to ensure that children are not able to access inappropriate material and that the adults at home need to be aware of the websites children are accessing.


Accelerated Reading

Albany Park planting

At Prince of Wales we take climate change seriously through our engaging curriculum and the learning experiences for our children. On Thursday, our recently elected School Parliament members had the opportunity to make a difference in Albany Park. With our colleagues at Thames 21 the children got to see the new river route and planted a range of plants in the river and wetlands. These plants will thrive in the wet and muddy conditions.





As well as planting, the School Parliament members met Councillor Sabri Ozaydin, Mayor of Enfield and the Deputy Mayor of London for Environment & Energy Shirley Rodrigues. The children explained the planting activity and what they can do to make a difference to climate change. They also met the Enfield Society who showed them artefacts from the dig. Some pottery dated back to Tudor times.

Next term we will be celebrating trees in our tree week and children from across the school will have opportunities to plant trees our school grounds and in the Salmons Brook basin.

WHATEVER YOU CHOOSE TO DO, DON'T DO NOTHING.

SOME PARENTS OR GUARDIANS FIND OUT TOO LATE THAT YOUNG PEOPLE HAVE BEEN ACCESSING INAPPROPRIATE PLATFORMS OR CONTENT.

Some devices have built-in controls which can be activated, or you can sync your child's phone to your phone so that you can see which apps have been downloaded;

- Google Family Link is a free android app for under 13s, which can be controlled by the parent's iPhone or Android phone.
- iPhone's iOS 12 offers controls at the operating system level.
- Net-aware.org.uk lets you check out any app before its downloaded and you can see independent reviews of the risks of any app.

Black history Tube map


Experience London is about showcasing the best our Capital has to offer. We've scoured the streets above and below ground to bring you the best – from the big attractions and hidden gems to local favourites. London has so much to offer and we're here to help you uncover it all – and get there!

We've teamed up with the Black Cultural Archives to launch the first ever Black History Tube map, celebrating the rich and varied contribution Black people have made to London and the UK from Pre Tudor times to the present day.

<u>The Black Cultural Archives</u> is the home of Black British History, conceived in 1981 as a monument to hold space and collect, preserve and celebrate the histories of people of African and Caribbean descent in the UK to inspire and give strength to individuals, communities and society.

From the woman who both founded Britain's first major Black newspaper and co-founding of Notting Hill Carnival, to London-based Georgian entrepreneur Cesar Picton, there's plenty to be seen across all lines! Here are a few stand-outs we wanted to share.
