1990s BRITPOP THRONE by 2L





2L's throne was inspired by the Britpop music culture of the 1990s.

Like nearly all musical trends, Britpop was about songs, guitars, jackets, and attitude. It was the first time that the charts in Britain, and most of the world, were dominated by great British musicians and bands. They

sang songs about life in Britain and issues that British people could relate to. Some of the most popular British bands in the 90s included Blur, Oasis, Pulp, and of course Take That, and the girl power inspiring group, The Spice Girls.

In the 90s people stated replacing their music cassette tapes for the first time ever, to new modern CDs!

To make our throne, we first used acrylic paint to give it a base colour.

We researched and included the Top of the Pops logo because most of these bands performed on this popular weekly programme.

Then, we carefully cut felt and layered it to show the well-known Britpop design, which appeared on many music magazines at the time. It was a bit tricky cutting some the letters.

Finally, we stuck CDs all around the edges to show their importance, and how they changed the way people listened to music in the 90s.







1990s MIXTAPE THRONE by 2A

Year 2's focus for their History lessons was the '90s. We have learnt why the 90s were important and what major events happened during that decade.





We decided to design a throne based on the theme of disco and what music was popular in that decade. We have listened to different popular bands and songs in the '90s such as Take That, Spice Girls, Boyzone and Westlife.

Back in the '90s, someone could create a mixtape simply by putting a cassette tape in a cassette recorder and recording music playing from another source (like a boombox or even another cassette player). A mixtape maker would carefully construct their tape to play a series of songs in a specific order, usually as a way to express their feelings to someone they cared about through music.

In a post-playlist era, that sounds incredibly simple, but trust us, there was much more labour and time involved in creating a good mixtape.

How did we make our chair?

First, we carefully painted it in purple. We then selected a few decorations linked to our theme and attached them to our throne using glue and blue tac. Using a cardboard box, we made a cassette player for the lower part. Finally, we added some glitter tape for the throne's legs.



1997 HARRY POTTER THRONE by 2T

J K Rowling, a British author, came up with the idea of the epic tale of a boy wizard in the early 1990s. The first book was titled '**Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone'**. The book reached the top of the best-sellers list and stayed there for years. J K Rowling continued the series by writing six more novels.





The books have been translated into over 80 languages, won multiple awards, and sold more than 500 million copies worldwide. They become the best-selling book series in history.

To make our chair, we first covered the seat and top with a white and black Tshirt and stuffed the seat with a towel. We then used silk fabric to make the cloak. We cut out the tie using tweed material. Harry's glasses were made using black pipe-cleaners and his broomstick from twigs collected from our garden and wrapped with brown felt. Finally, we made his hat from black sugar paper.

We wrapped the legs of the chair with red, white and blue string, representing our UK flag colours to link in with our school celebration of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee.

Reception Summer Café












We have been reading the book Stanley Stick. We invited our parents to our café and we took part in lots of activities using sticks of all lengths and widths.



We made wands, dogs and journey sticks using string, tape and feathers. We drew and measured stick man. We used sticks to draw in shaving foam or corn flour. We used lollypop sticks to make shapes and patterns.

We then listened to the opening chapter of 'The Magic Faraway Tree' by Enid Blyton. This brought back many happy memories for lots of parents! We then made fantasy creatures and faces out of clay – this was great fun! These clay faces were then placed on our willow tree.

Y5 had a great turn out their Cafés where the children enjoyed a range of activities! Staff had the opportunity to model how we read stories to our classes and explained the importance of asking questions to extend thinking and deepen understanding of stories.







A tree trail lead everyone around a number of trees, ending up with the children's focus tree next year, the Walnut tree. There was some sketching of the Sycamore tree and an interesting discussion around its prominent gash. There was a little sing along too where some children treated their parents to a song!













Y6 Outdoor Cafés

In their final Café' as Prince of Wales students, year 6 took their parents on an intriguing and educational '*leaf hunt'*. Clues were left around the school on a variety of tress, and using their map reading skills and dendrological knowledge, parents and students identified some of the wonderful plants we have in our grounds.





After, pupils paired up for a game of 'tree top trumps', while teachers read them '*There once is a Queen'* - a story my Michael Morpurgo which involved a very royal oak!
