Epiphany

Marking the official end to the Christmas season, the Feast of Epiphany (Epiphany comes from the Greek word 'epiphaneia' which means appearance.) is one of the oldest Christian holidays and is usually celebrated around 6th January.

History of Epiphany

In various churches, Epiphany commemorates different events but most associate it with the Biblical story of Jesus' baptism in the Jordan River where God acknowledged him as his son. In some churches, the feast also celebrates the Biblical stories of Jesus' visit from the Wise Men and the first miracle he performed (turning water into wine) at the wedding in Cana. All of these stories revolve around the idea that these are events where Jesus is revealed as the son of God.

Throughout the world, Epiphany is a significant time for Christians and is often celebrated with a unique service in church. In some churches, the dates of other feast days for the year, such as Easter, are announced during Epiphany services.

Many scholars believe that the Feast of Epiphany predates Christmas. In his writings, Clement of Alexandria, an early Christian missionary and teacher, mentions a feast celebrating the baptism of Jesus in AD 215. Christmas was not an official holiday until AD 336.
