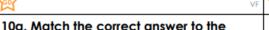

Usually celebrated around 6<sup>th</sup> January, the Feast of Epiphany (Epiphany comes from the Greek word 'epiphaneia', which means appearance.) is one of the oldest Christian holidays and often signals the end of the Christmas period.

## **History of Epiphany**

Most churches link Epiphany with the Biblical story of Jesus' baptism in the Jordan River where God proclaimed that he was his son. In some churches, the feast also celebrates the Biblical events of Jesus' visit from the Wise Men and the first miracle he performed (turning water into wine) at the wedding in Cana. The central theme for all of these stories is that Jesus is revealed as the son of God.

Worldwide, Epiphany is an important time for Christians and is often marked with a particular service in church. Many historians believe that the Feast of Epiphany is older than Christmas. In AD 215, Clement of Alexandria, an early Christian missionary and teacher, mentioned in his writings a feast honouring the baptism of Jesus. Christmas was not celebrated formally until AD 336.
